JUDGE NOTHING BEFORE THE TIME I COR. 4:1-6

Introduction:

- A. There are two wrong ideas about judging.
 - 1. No judgment.
 - 2. Over judgment.
- B. Paul Knew his ministry would be judged.
 - 1. How should this be done?
 - 2. With what shall we compare the ministry? :
- I. THE TWO COMPARATIVE PROFESSIONS. V1,2
 - A. "let a man so account of us."
 - account = logizomai to put together an account, to count, to value, to put together.
 - 2. If a man wants to compare us, to evaluate us, to learn what we are to be....
 - B. "as the ministers of Christ."
 - ministers = huperetes an under-rower, or a common sailor, as distinguished from nautal, a sea man, "on epibatai" = mariners. Hence a hand, any subordinate acting under the direction of another. (An attendant in a synagogue.)
 - 2. We are subordinate to Christ, not the church.
 - 3. "subordinate, to Christ."
 - C. "and stewards of the mysteries of God."
 - stewards = oikonomos a house manager, one who had authority over the servants of a family, assigning their tasks, and generally managing the affairs and accounts of the family.
 - 2. mystery = the secret of a friend.
 - 3. "and managers authorized to distribute the secret truths of God."

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- D. How do you judge a steward?
 - 1. v2.
 - faithful = trusty, worthy of confidence, to be trusted.
 - 3. There are two ways to judge church attendance.
 - a. How many times they came. (unfaithful)
 - b. How many times they missed. (faithful)

II. PAUL'S THOUGHTS ABOUT OTHERS JUDGMENT OF HIM. .

- A. "for it is a very small thing that I should be judged of you."
 - 1. small = elachistos the least, not "mikros" small,
 not "oligos" little, superlative.
 - 2. Judged = anakrino intense investigation.
- B. "or of man's judgment."
 - judgment = hemera = day, the day or time of man's judgment in opposition to the "lords day."
 - 2. I Cor. 3:13.
- C. "yea, I judge not mine own self."
 - 1. I do not trust my own judgment in this matter.
 - It is difficult to correctly judge oneself.
- D. "for I know nothing by myself."
 - 1. My conscience does not, in fact, reproach me.
 - 2. Warped or seared conscience can give a wrong reading
- E. "yet am I not hereby justified."
 - 1. Justified = to justify by a judicial act.
 - 2. This does not prove I am innocent.
- F. "but he that judgeth me is the Lord."
 - 1. The Lord is the judge at the final judgment.
 - 3. Absolute truth, represented by "fire" will try every man's work, of what sort it is.
 - 3. sort = or Kind, more than quantity.

III. THE TIME WILL COME FOR TRUE JUDGMENT.

- A. "therefore judge nothing before the time."
 - 1. What is, "the time?"
 - 2. "until the Lord comes."
- B. The two things in judging that only Jesus can do.
 - "who will bring to light the hidden things of darkness."
 - a. For He will light up the darkness that now hides things.
 - 2. "and will make manifest the counsels of the heart."
 - a. manifest = to make visible.
 - b. counsels = will, purpose, plans, design.
- C. The righteous Judge will judge righteously.
 - 1. "and then shall every man have praise of God."
 - 2. And then everyone will receive the praise due him.
 - 3. I'm not being noticed enough, Wait!

IV. THE REASON PAUL WROTE THESE TRUTHS. V6

- A. "And these things, brethren, I have transferred to myself and to Apollos for your sakes;"
 - transferred = metaschematizo to change the outward figure, to transfer a thing in its application, to transfer the thoughts as to one object to another which is an image of it.
 - I have used myself and Apollos above as illustrations.
- B. The truth declared.
 - "that ye might learn in us not to think of men above what is written."
 - So that ye might learn from us not to go beyond the scriptures.

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- 3. "that no one of you be puffed up for one against another."
 - a. So you may not be arrogant champions of one teacher against another.
 - b. puff = to inflate.
- C. Don't judge before the time.
 - 1. Can't pick out crowns before that day.
