Introduction:

- A. The Bible teaches us to be truthful.
 - 1. When it benefits us.
 - 2. When it wounds us.
- B Paul continues to teach the Corinthian church.
 - 1. He corrects them, he encourages them.
 - About schisms, the work of the ministry, spiritual gifts, the resurrection.
- C. At this time he teaches them how they are to aid financially the saints at Jerusalem.
 - There are specific truths.
 - 2. There are helpful principles.
 - 3. Not an example of How to support the church.

I. THE SPECIFIC TRUTHS.

- A. There is to be a collection.
 - 1. collection = logia a gathering.
 - 2. Not a matter of church vote.
- B. It was for people.
 - 1. "for the saints."
 - 2. They lived in Jerusalem.
- C. It was a common church practice.
 - "as I have given order in the churches of Galatia, even so do ye."
 - 2. order = diatasso to arrange throughout
- D. It was a simple plan.
 - 1. "upon the first day of the week."
 - a. This was the day of worship.

- 2. "every one of you."
 - a. There were no exceptions.
- 3. "lay by him in store."
 - a. store = thesaurizo to treasure up.
- 4. "as God hath prospered him."
 - a. suodomai to be led in a good way.
- E. The reason for the plan.
 - 1. "that there be no gatherings when I come."
 - gathering = logia a collection as of money.
 - To avoid, after the fact giving.
- F. The final act of the plan. v3.4
 - liberality = charis what causes joy; gift.
 - letter = epistole anything sent by a messenger, whether verbal or written, usually a letter.
- 3. Then on my arrival, I shall give letters of recommendation to the persons you have selected and send them on with your contribution to Jerusalem. And if it seems advisable that I should go also, they shall go with me.
 - II. HELPFUL TRUTHS FOR THE CHURCH TODAY.
 - A. We should give periodically.
 - 1. "first day of the week."
 - B. We should give personally.
 - 1. "let every one of you."
 - The financial support of any church is not the burden of a few.
 - C. We should give with a purpose.
 - 1. "lay by him in store."
 - This idea emphasizes deliberate thought. It means do it at home and bring it to church.
 - D. We should give proportionally.

- 1. "as God hath prospered him."
- prospered = led in a good way.
- 3. Has God been good to you?
- E. We should give preventively.
 - 1. "that there be no gatherings when I come."
 - 2. Some members will not give unless there is a crisis.
 - We are to give if there is more than enough to do what is routine.

III. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF I DON'T GIVE?

[A mean and wicked question]

- A. Will God take it anyway?
 - 1. sickness, hospital bills.
 - 2. Increased cost of living.
- B. We are to help the poor saints.
 - 1. Not the world's poor.
 - 2. The poor of other churches.
- B. Ask yourself, do I serve better prospering or suffering?
 - 1. Therein may be the answer.
- IV. WHAT WILL HAPPEN IF I DO GIVE?

[A mean and wicked question!]

- V. CHRUCHES SHOULD BE WATCHFUL, IN LOVE. V13.14
 - A. Paul's appeal.
 - 1. "watch ye."
 - 2. "stand fast in the faith."
 - 3. "quit ye like men."
 - 4. "be strono."

- B. All of these things must be done in love.
 - 1. "Let all your things be done with charity."
 - 2. We may do these things in anger.

VI. CHURCHES SHOULD FOLLOW GOOD LEADERSHIP. V15-16

- A. Paul had a favor to ask.
 - 1. "I have this favor to ask of you."
 - 2. Not a silly consideration, nor was it wrong!
- B. The objects of his request.
 - 1. "Stephanas and his household."
 - 2. "first to be converted in Greece."
- C. Their devotion to God's work.
 - "they have addicted themselves to supplying the needs of the saints."
 - addicted = tasso to appoint.
 - 3. self-appointed family to serve God.
- D. Paul's request.
 - I beg you to put yourselves under leaders like these.
 - 2. And to everyone who shares their work and toils hard

VII. PREACHERS NEED ONE ANOTHER. V17.18

- A. Paul was glad to see visiting brethren.
 - 1. "I am glad."
 - glad = chairo to rejoice, to be delighted.
- B. They brought an offering.
 - 1. "they have supplied that which was lacking."
 - 2. lacking = hustereo to be last, fall short.
- C. Paul was refreshed.
 - I. "for they have refreshed my spirit and yours."

- 2. They have cheered my heart and yours.
- 3. Recognize the worth of such men as these.

VIII. EARLY CHURCHES WERE NOT LARGE IN NUMBER. V19

- A. House churches were common.
 - 1. They met in homes for many years.
 - 2. "church houses" are of late origin.
- B. The churches in Wales met from early 1600 to late 1700 before constructing the first house.
 - 1. Membership from teens to 100 in about a century.
- C. The church is Boston had the door nailed shut for 10 years.
