THE CHRISTIAN AND CIVIL POWER TITUS 3:1-2

Introduction:

- A. The Cretians lived in two worlds.
 - 1. Citizens of spiritual.
 - 2. Citizens of Temporal.
- B. How shall we behave in each?
 - 1. Instructions on how to live and behave in church.
 - 2. Chapter 3:1,2 teaches them to obey Civil Authority.
- C. Many churches teach civil disobedience.
 - 1. Marches to protest many things.
 - Church should not involve itself in MOST civil issues.

I. "PUT THEM IN MIND."

- A. hupomimnisko = to cause them to remember, remind them.
 - 1. Don't let them forget!

II. "TO BE SUBJECT TO PRINCIPLALITIES AND POWERS."

- A. subject hupotasso = put one's self under the authority of another.
- B. Principalities = the first person or thing that commences, the rule.
- C. Powers = echousia = delegated authority, duly constituted authority.
 - 1. Difference between Titus and Eph. 6:12.

III. "TO OBEY MAGISTRATES."

A. To obey a ruler or superior.

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 - B. To be obedient.
 - C. "To obey and do good works."
- IV. "TO SPEAK EVIL OF NO MAN."
 - A. Do not rail at people, do not be argumentative.
 - B. To tell the truth is not speaking evilly!
- V. "TO BE NO BRAWLERS."
 - A. brawlers = do not engage in fist fights.
- VI. "TO BE GENTLE."
 - A. gentle = epiekeis = it expresses a moderation which recognizes the impossibility of cleaving to all formal law. Not always insisting on legal rights.
 - B. Could be translated as, "Sweet reasonableness."
- VI. "SHEWING ALL MEEKNESS TO ALL MEN."
 - A. meekness = not outward behaviour only but first affected in the heart. An acceptance of His will and everything that happens, not quarrelsome against God, therefore gentle toward men.
